Members of TN-B, plus one couple from TN-M that heard about the ride and asked to come along, had a very enjoyable overnighiter to tour Chimney Rock and Lake Lure in NC on Saturday, followed by stops on the way home to check out some neat waterfalls in the Highlands NC area.




We met up at the Strawberry Plains Cracker Barrel Saturday morning and left there for the trip planned by Brian and David, using almost all secondary and country roads - the only time we got on an interstate was a quick about 7 miles ride on the I-240 Asheville, NC bypass (we sure didn't want to try to ride THROUGH Asheville). Some of the roads were a LOT of fun and a couple what some would call "challenging", but nobody complained, not much anyway, LOL. It included a short jaunt on the infamous "Rattlesnake", route 209 outside of Hot Springs NC. Brian was leading and he did TRY to keep to a

slightly more "sedate" pace, and watching behind he could see his little ducklings all merrily lined up behind him and keeping up, so he figured he couldn't be doing too bad, and no one gave him a hard time at any of the butt-break stops.

After all that fun on the twisties of the Rattlesnake, we stopped for a nice lunch at the Spring Creek Café little ways up 209 from Hot Springs. This appears to be a favorite stop for a lot of the motorcyclists out enjoying a ride on 209. After lunch, we took a different route onto 63 east towards Asheville.



We arrived at our motel in Hendersonville in the mid-afternoon, everyone got checked in, and we all met back in the parking lot in short order to ride to Chimney Rock State Park and Lake Lure. Being true Gold Wings, we determined that we ought to keep our eyes open for a nice place in town for dinner ... you gotta be prepared, right? As we rode through the town of Chimney Rock on our way to the Park, we saw several places that looked interesting. Passing one restaurant along the side of the road that was advertising Bar-B-Que, and smelling that unique and enticing aroma coming out, we all figured we had our dinner stop planned.



We rode into the Chimney Rock State Park and up the long and winding road to the parking area at the top. From the parking lot you had two options, climbing the stairs or walking through a tunnel chiseled through the rock to an elevator that took you to the top. No one was adventurous enough to consider climbing the stairs, we all wimped out and took the elevator, conveniently designed that it stopped inside the gift shop. You walked through the gift shop and snack bar to get to the walkway that took you past some overlook areas to the steps taking you up the rest of the way to the



top of Chimney Rock. From the top of Chimney Rock there is some really awesome scenery in every direction you looked, and you got a good look at Lake Lure in the distance.



After leaving Chimney Rock, we continued on to Lake Lure, parked in a marina parking lot and walked out to a very picturesque gazebo area jutting into the lake. A wedding party was in the gazebo, finishing the photography of the wedding party, so we didn't go into the gazebo, just meandered on the walkway along the lake shore. After enjoying the ambiance of such a setting, we got back on the bikes for the short ride back to Chimney Rock for



dinner.

The town of Chimney Rock is a typical tourist destination, lots of quaint shops and restaurant along the roadside, LOTS of vehicles and motorcycles going back-and-forth along the road, and lots of tourists walking from shop-to-shop. We eventually



parking right in front for all of us to park together, which was quite an accomplishment under the circumstances. The aromas that had captured our fancy on the way out were not deceptive, we got our food, took it outside to eat at picnic tables alongside the river and thoroughly enjoyed some great food, neat scenery, and of course great friends, it just doesn't get any better than that! After that great dinner, we took a leisurely ride back to our motel in Hendersonville for the end of a really great day, with some nice views of a pretty sunset in front of us.

After Sunday morning breakfast in the motel, we checked out and hit the road for our trip home, continuing west on 64 towards Highlands, NC. We planned for a more careful ride along the first part of 64 from Highlands, as we knew this was where several waterfalls could be found along the roadside, some without much advanced warning. Our first falls, "Bridal Veil Falls", came up suddenly right after a right-hand curve and Brian was able to turn into a convenient side road that had been built that allows vehicles to actually ride behind the falls. Our stop there, with a couple of the bikes sitting behind the falls, gave us a great opportunity for a photo op.



After leaving Bridal Veil Falls, we hadn't gone very far before seeing a pull-off area with a nice parking area, set up for another of the more famous waterfalls in the area, called "Dry Falls". They sure weren't dry when we were there, quite an impressive sight and we could see walkways zig-zagging down the side of the hill that eventually got you down and closer to the falls, actually allowing the walkers to go behind the falls. No one was interested in the walk at this time, though a few of us said this would be a fun ride for another time with a longer stop here to walk down and see the falls "up close and personal". Plans for another ride that could be done in a day?



After leaving Dry Falls, we knew there were other falls along our way, but there weren't going to be any safe pull-off areas, so it was understood that we would just have to "catch a glimpse" as we went by. With the curvy road and the way some of the cage drivers didn't keep in their lanes, we knew it wouldn't be safe to try to stop along the narrow shoulder, if there even was one. We did get to see a couple others, the co-riders better than the riders as we had to concentrate on the road itself other than really quick looks.

Continuing on 64 north to Franklin we decided it would be a good stop for lunch, and David and Randy from TN-M said they knew of a Fatz Café there, so we had our lunch stop all figured out ... minor detail, we just needed to FIND the Fatz. After a little riding around and finally a stop for directions, we found it, and arrived right after the after Church crowd got there, darn, now for a fairly long wait. Oh well, the food was worth it. After lunch we continued towards home, with a stop in Cherokee for, what else, DQ! We had an interesting talk there with a couple that had rented a Harley trike to "check out a trike". They stated after their ride on Saturday on that trike they were beat up and sore (it didn't have independent suspension) and asked what our Gold Wing trikes were like. Of course you know we gave them the whole story and a list of the major trike kit manufacturers with the suggestion they see about renting a Gold Wing trike to try it out. They let Frank ride their rental around the DQ parking lot a couple times and he agreed with them that the way the suspension was, it certainly did beat the riders up. Who knows, we may have converted someone and set up a potential new GWRRA member.

After DQ we knew some of us would split off. Frank & Patti, and Randy & Marlene from TN-M split off near the Sugarloaf visitor center, while David and Brian continued, taking the bypass around Gatlinburg, through Pigeon Forge, got into the only rain on the whole trip while in Sevierville, then on to home.

Everyone commented what a great ride it was, a fantastic weekend, and how much enjoyment they all had, so we count this one as a total success, and David and I are happy that everyone had a good time, AND that the weather was as nice as it was for us. UP FRONT

In 2012, 4,957 people died in motorcycle crashes, up 7.1 percent from 4,630 in 2011, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA).

In 2012, 93,000 motorcyclists were injured, up from 81,000 in 2011.

Motorcyclists were about 26 times more likely than passenger car occupants to die in a crash per vehicle mile traveled in 2012 and five times more likely to be injured.

There were about 8.5 million motorcycles on the road in 2012.

THE TOPIC

Motorcycle riding has become more popular in recent years, appealing to a new group of enthusiasts consisting of older and more affluent riders. There were about 8.5 million motorcycles on the road in 2012, according to the U.S. Department of Transportation.

Motorcycles are by their nature far less **crashworthy** than closed vehicles. They are also less **visible** to other drivers and pedestrians and less **stable** than four-wheel vehicles. Operating a motorcycle requires a **different combination of physical and mental skills** than those used in driving four-wheel vehicles. Motorcyclists and their passengers are more **vulnerable** to the hazards of weather and road conditions than drivers in closed vehicles.

In 2012, motorcycle fatalities rose 7.1 percent to 4,957 from 4,630 in 2011. In 2012, 60 out of every 100,000 registered motorcycles was involved in a

fatal crash, compared with only 14 out of every 100,000 passenger cars, according to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA). Motorcyclists were about 26 times more likely than passenger car occupants to die in a crash per vehicle mile traveled in 2012 and five times more likely to be injured, according to NHTSA. (Note: statistics on fatal motorcycle crashes are also available from the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.)

KEY FACTS

According to a report by the Governors Highway Safety Association (GHSA), motorcyclist fatalities are projected to decrease 7 percent to 4,610 in 2013 from 4,957 in 2012. The GHSA notes that despite the projected 7 percent decrease in rider deaths in 2013, which was due to bad weather, motorcyclist safety has not improved in fifteen years, basically due to declining helmet use.

2012 Crash Data: According to the U.S. Department of Transportation's National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2012, 4,967 people died in motorcycle crashes, up 7.1 percent from 4,630 in 2011.

According to the latest data available from the Federal Highway Administration, there were 8.5 million private and commercial motorcycles on U.S. roads in 2012, compared with 8.0 million in 2009.

Fatalities among motorcyclists age **50 and older increased** by 119 in 2012, compared with 2011, or 7.7 percent, according to the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

Some 112,000 motorcycles were involved in crashes in 2012, including property damage only crashes, according to NHTSA.

Motorcyclists were about 26 times more likely than passenger car occupants to die in a crash per vehicle mile traveled in 2012 and five times more likely to be injured, according to NHTSA.

The fatality rate per registered vehicle for motorcyclists in 2012 was six times the fatality rate for passenger car occupants, according to NHTSA.

Please understand that this article is not to scare you, but to provide information on accumulated data so we may be more aware and safer riders. Enjoy the ride and let's help lower those statistics

Ride Coordinator Report

Hello my fellow Bee's. I have a few things that I would like to talk about today. The first thing I would like to talk about is hotel reservations. When we have our ride meeting in November at Tom and Kathy's house, we set up our schedule for the next year. I'm given the final schedule from Kathy and take them home with me and look at a particular time schedule that was good for everyone for the rides. One way I have learned from Kathy on determining what kind of hotel to stay in is price, and ratings. One of the best engines that I used to find these hotels is Trip advisor; these are really honest critiques of the motels with what's wrong and what's right with them including service and conditions of the motel itself. Another determining factor is price for the room itself. Please when you are making your reservations if at all possible use the computer. When you get a return email, print it and file it in a notebook.

When you have decided that you are going on a particular trip please, I repeat please, make your reservations as soon as possible. I generally go to the motels corporate reservation page and check out prices. I generally try to find the cheapest and like I said the best rated hotel for the money. Even if it's a year out please make your reservations because we generally have a 24 or 48 hour window in which to cancel the reservation.

An example being I checked out hotels for Wing Ding in Huntsville and found that the Homewood Suites is full (or needs to be booked through the visitors' bureau). So being from Huntsville, I know the general layout of the city and found the Double Tree on South Parkway for \$92 a night, this is an all-suite hotel. The rate from the Huntsville Visitors Bureau was \$129 a night. So I typed in the dates for Wing Ding and found out that the rates for \$92 versus \$ 129, and with going through the Hilton website, I got a
